# DRIVING BAN ENDS FOR WOMEN IN SAUDI ARABIA

# Driving ban to end for women in Saudi Arabia

- Saudi Arabia's king has announced that women will have permission to drive for the first time. Saudi women showed their joy on social media, calling it a very important moment for the country.
- The Gulf kingdom is the only country that currently bans women from driving. Only men are allowed a licence, and women who drive in public are often fined or arrested.
- a. Many activists were also happy about the decision, as well as important figures from around the world. US President Donald Trump said it was a "positive step" forward for women in Saudi Arabia.
- The news was announced on Saudi Arabian television and at a media event in Washington at the same time. Some reports say that this was done to show the rest of the world that the country wants to move forward.
- 5. Sahar Nassif, an activist from Jeddah, said that she was "very, very excited" - jumping up and down and laughing. "I'm going to buy my dream car, a convertible Mustang, and it's going to be black and yellow!"
- 4. The driving ban will end on the 24th of June 2018. There will be a special government team to give advice and to make the necessary changes to complete the royal order.
- Percause of the law, many families have employed private drivers for their female relatives. Foreign chauffeurs are popular, and families often feed them and give them a place to live.
- a. The country's US ambassador, Prince Khaled bin Salman, confirmed that women would not need a

- man's permission to take driving lessons, and they would also be able to drive anywhere they wanted to go. He said it was "a historic and big day" and "the right decision at the right time".
- Groups in Saudi Arabia have campaigned for years to allow women to drive, and some women have even been put in prison for driving in public. Saudi activist Loujain al-Hathloul, who was held by police for 73 days in 2014 for ignoring the ban, tweeted "thank God" after the news.
- Manal al-Sharif, an organiser of the Women2Drive campaign who was also put in prison for driving, said on Twitter that Saudi Arabia would "never be the same again".
- The hashtags "I am my own guardian" and "Saudi Women Can Drive" quickly became popular on social media.
- However, not everyone was happy about the news, as many people said that they thought things should stay the way they are. People also complained about the government changing ancient laws that are about women.
- Others said that even though this is a step forward, Saudi Arabia can still do more to make its society more equal for women.
- With the world's focus on this decision, the Saudi Arabian Crown Prince is also promoting a programme called Vision 2030. The idea is that it will help modernise Saudi society.
