PRESENT PERFECT vs SIMPLE PAST

1.1 FORM

With most verbs, the simple past form and the past participle (used in present perfect) look the same, being formed by **adding -ed** to the base form:

<i>called</i>	<i>wanted</i>	<i>worked</i>	<i>liked</i>	<i>studied</i>	<i>played</i>	<i>stopped</i>
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But there are a lot of irregular past simple and past participle forms in English. Here are the most common irregular past simple forms (the second column) and past participles forms (the third column):

1.2 USE

a) We use the **past simple** to talk about something that started and finished in the past. It happened in the past:

- They worked here for 10 years, but now they're retired.
- She lived in Santiago all her life before she moved to Puerto Cisne.
- We were fans of swimming when we lived near a lake.

But we use the **present perfect** to talk about something that started in the past and continues in the present:

- They have worked here for 10 years.
- She has lived in Santiago all her life.
- We have always been fans of swimming.

b) We use the **past simple** to talk about our experiences in the past:

- I never saw films on Netflix because I didn't have Netflix.
- Tom rode a motorcycle to work.
- I appeared in the last Star Wars movie.

But we use the **present perfect** to talk about our experiences up to the present:

- I've seen that film before.
- Tom has ridden a motorcycle.
- I've never appeared in a movie.

c) We use the **present perfect** ever-questions and their answers:

- A: Have you ever tried pineapple pizza?
B: Yes, I have.
- A: Have you ever met a celebrity?
B: No, I haven't.
- A: Has she ever played tennis professionally?
B: Yes, she has.

We (usually) use the **past simple** with *wh*-questions and their answers:

- A: **When** did you try pineapple pizza?
B: When I was in Hawaii.
- A: **Where** did you meet a celebrity?
B: I met one at a restaurant in Hollywood.
- A: **Why** did she write that email?
B: She wrote it because it was urgent.

Usually, the first question is an **ever-question**. If the answer is "yes", we may ask a follow-up **wh-question**:

| · A: <u>Have you ever taken</u> an Uber? | B: Yes, I <u>have</u> . |
| A: Why <u>did you take</u> an Uber? | B: I <u>took</u> an Uber because I was late for work. |
| · A: <u>Have you ever seen</u> a snake? | B: Yes, I <u>have</u> . |
| A: Where <u>did you see</u> it? | B: I <u>saw</u> it when I was in a national park. |
